

This Meeting's Plan:

- How to Cite and How to use a Reference List
- Where to find resources

When you cite, if you use the person's **IDEAS**, you give his year published.
If you use his **WORDS**, you give his name, his year published, and his page number.

EXAMPLE:

I have researched and found that composition can be started by finding a tonic key. Tonic keys are very important as a starter. in fact, Webb (1998) says it's the first thing to do. Webb has written that "the tonic key is the starting point for any good composition" (Webb, 1998, p.245). What I learned from Webb was that I need to make sure I have a good tonic for my piece. I think I will go for C major because it's an easy key to use. **(THAT'S REFLECTION!)**
